

Application for a premises licence to be granted under the Licensing Act 2003

Summary

The report summarises an application for a premises licence to be granted.

Recommendation

That members consider the application for a premises licence to be granted under the Licensing Act 2003 - To permit the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises at 9 Rolle Street, Exmouth, EX8 1HE.

a) Reasons for Recommendation

To comply with statutory processes.

b) Alternative Options

To either grant, refuse or modify the application.

c) Risk Considerations

None

d) Policy and Budgetary Considerations

The Council's Licensing Policy is referred to in the body of the report. There is a possibility of the Council having to pay the applicant's court costs if a successful appeal is brought against the decisions made today.

e) Date for Review of Decision

The council's decision may be appealed to the Magistrates Court. The Licensing Act 2003 also contains review provisions.

1 Description of Application

- 1.1 An application has been received from Anthony Hodgson for the grant of a premises licence at Courtlands House, Courtlands Lane, Exmouth EX8 3NZ.
- 1.2 The premises are a three storey building located on the corner of Rolle Street and Market Street within an area of mixed commercial and residential properties in the centre of Exmouth. The first and second floors are in residential use. The area for public trade will be on the ground floor only and consist of a retail area with separate stock rooms and staff facilities.
- 1.3 A plan of the premises will be available at the meeting to show the layout of the establishment and the areas of licensable activity.
- 1.4 The proposed timings and licensable activities applied for are produced in table form at **Appendix A**.

2 Statutory Bodies' Response

- 2.6 East Devon District Council, Planning & Countryside Service No representations have been received

3 Responses to Notices of Hearing

3.1 Details of the responses to the statutory Notice of Hearing are attached at Appendix C.

4 Proposed Operating Schedule

- 4.1 The applicants have prepared an Operating Schedule setting out the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives. A copy of the proposed Operating Schedule, numbered for ease of reference is attached at Appendix D.
- 4.2 The Devon & Cornwall Constabulary representations relate to all four licensing objectives, the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm. They are concerned that if the licence is granted there will be an increase in violent crime, anti social behaviour, nuisance and disorder. Corncern is also expressed that an intensification of licensed premises is unsuitable for the locality.

5 Relevant Licensing Policy Considerations

Licensing Objectives

- 5.1 Section 2.1 of the Policy states: 'The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Act to carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives.' These objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining the application and any conditions attached must be necessary to achieve the licensing objectives.
- 5.2 Section 2.2 of the Policy states: A licence will only be granted where the licensing authority is satisfied that these objectives have been met.
- 5.3 Section 2.3 of the Policy lists the kind of measures the licensing authority will be expecting to see taken into account to promote the objectives.

Conditions

- 5.4 Section 4 of the policy sets out what the Sub Committee should consider before imposing conditions on a licence.
- 5.5 The **Guidance** issued under Section 182 Licensing Act 2003 also states:

The licensing authority may not impose any conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following receipt of relevant representations and it has been satisfied at a hearing of the

necessity to impose conditions. It may then only impose conditions that are necessary to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives. Such conditions must also be expressed in unequivocal and unambiguous terms to avoid legal dispute.

It is perfectly possible that in certain cases, because the test is one of necessity, where there are other legislative provisions which are relevant and must be observed by the applicant, no additional conditions at all are needed to promote the licensing objectives.

The Act requires that licensing conditions should be tailored to the size, style, characteristics and activities taking place at the premises concerned.

Licensing authorities should therefore ensure that any conditions they impose are only those which are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, which means that they must not go further than what is needed for that purpose.

Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for the licensing objectives. If other existing law already places certain statutory responsibilities on an employer or operator of premises, it cannot be necessary to impose the same or similar duties.

Cumulative Impact

- Section 5.1 of the policy states: The cumulative impact of licensed premises on the 5.6 promotion of the licensing objectives is a matter which the licensing authority can take into account. This should not however, be equated with 'need' which relates more to the commercial demand for a particular type of premises. The issue of 'need' is a matter for planning consideration or for the market to decide and does not form part of this licensing policy statement.
- Section 5.2 of the policy states: The licensing authority may receive representations from 5.7 either a responsible authority or an interested party (see glossary), that the cumulative impact of new licences is leading to an area becoming saturated with premises of a particular type, making it a focal point and thereby creating exceptional problems of disorder and nuisance over and above the impact from the individual premises themselves. In such cases the issue of cumulative impact can be taken into account when considering the individual merits of any application. The onus is on any person or organisation making such representations to prove any assertion that the addition of the premises concerned would cause the cumulative impact claimed.
 - Section 5.3 of the policy states: The licensing authority will not operate a quota of 5.8 any kind, which would pre-determine any application, nor will it seek to impose general limitations on trading hours in particular areas. Regard will be given to the individual characteristics of the premises concerned within a given area. It is recognised that pubs, nightclubs, restaurants, hotels, theatres, and other clubs all sell alcohol, serve food and provide entertainment, but with contrasting styles and characteristics. Proper regard will be made to those differences and the impact they are likely to have on the local community. This may result in the amenity of local residents being placed under severe pressure; it will not always be possible to attribute a particular problem to customers of particular premises. This means that whilst enforcement action to ensure conditions are complied with is taken, this may not resolve all problems.

Licensing Hours

Section 6.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority will deal with the issue of licensing 5.8 hours on the individual merits of each application. However, when issuing a licence with licensing hours beyond midnight higher standards of control will generally need to be included in operating schedules to promote the licensing objectives especially for premises which are situated near residential areas. There is no presumption within the legislation for longer opening hours and the



licensing objectives are paramount in any consideration of an application.

5.9 Section 6.3 of the Policy states: The terminal hours will normally be approved where the applicant can show that the proposal would not adversely affect the licensing objectives unless, after hearing relevant representation the licensing authority believe it necessary, proportionate and reasonable to restrict the hours required.

Authrisation to Sell Alcohol

- 5.10 Section 7.1 of the Policy states: Where premises are licensed to sell or supply alcohol the licensing authority will expect a Personal Licence Holder to normally be present on the premises at all times when there are sales or the supply of alcohol taking place. However if arrangements are made in advance a Personal Licence holder may authorise another person to sell alcohol.
- 5.11 Section 7.2 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority will expect the Personal Licence holder who authorises another person to sell alcohol to ensure that: (a) the person is authorised in writing by the Personal Licence holder on whose behalf the person is selling or supplying alcohol; (b) the authorisation should specify the acts that may be carried out by the authorised person; (c) the person should be clearly identifiable; (d) there is in place sensible arrangements on a reasonably regular basis for the Personal Licence holder to monitor the activities that they have authorised.

Nuisance

5.10 Section 17.1 of the Policy states: To promote the licensing objectives, applicants for licences for licensable activities will be required to demonstrate the measures they have in place for the prevention of public nuisance. The impact of the licensable activities on people living in the vicinity should not be disproportionate or unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter. The prevention of public nuisance can include low-level nuisance affecting a few people living locally as well as a major disturbance affecting the whole community. It may also include the prevention of the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of interested parties.

6. Observations

- 6.1 The application being considered is for the grant of a Premises Licence to permit:

 the supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises
- 6.2 Representations have been received from the Devon & Cornwall Constabulary who believe that if the licence is granted it will fail to promote all four licensing objectives. They contend that the premises will be located within a crime & disorder hotspot where there is already a high volume of licensed premises.
- 6.3 The Sub Committee will now need to consider whether to grant this application as it stands or in the light of the representations to refuse the application or grant it in a different form. To assist the Sub Committee a set of conditions have been prepared at Appendix E that members may wish to consider having heard from both the applicant and the interested party. The conditions are in part suggested to replace those offered by the applicant with conditions that reflect the applicants intentions but offer a more concise and enforceable operating schedule.
- 6.4 A location plan is attached at Appendix F.

Legal Implications

 As relevant representations have been made in respect of the application, this hearing must be held. (Relevant representations are about the likely effect of the grant of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives, by interested parties or



responsible authorities). The sub-committee must disregard any information or evidence not relevant to the licensing objectives.

- 2. The sub-committee must consider this application in accordance with Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003, which requires that licensing functions must be carried out with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives. The licensing authority must also have regard to its own licensing policy and the Secretary of State's guidance, but may depart from both if it has good reason to do so. Those reasons should be stated.
- 3. Section 18 of the Act requires the licensing authority to grant a premises licence unless it considers additional steps are needed for the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to any relevant representations.

The steps are:

- (a) to grant the licence subject to:-
 - (i) the conditions in the operating schedule modified to such extent as members consider necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and
 - (ii) any condition which must under sections 19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence;
- (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates
- (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor
- (d) to reject the application.

The conditions of the licence are modified if any are altered or omitted or any new condition is added. Different conditions may be applied to different parts of the premises, and to different licensable activities. The sub-committee must give its reasons for its decision to take any of these steps. Similarly, if any part of an application is rejected, the sub-committee must give its reasons.

- 4. The Act requires mandatory conditions to be imposed where supplying alcohol or exhibiting films are approved as licensed activities. It also requires a mandatory condition to be imposed where door supervisors or other individuals carrying out security activities are conditions on the licence.
 - (a) Section 19 Mandatory conditions relating to the supply of alcohol
 No alcohol may be supplied unless there is a designated premises supervisor who also
 holds a personal licence.

Every supply of alcohol under a premises licence must be made or authorised by a personal licensee

(b) Section 20 - Mandatory condition relating to exhibition of films-not relevant in this case

Children may only be admitted to films in accordance with the classification recommendations of the British Board of Film Classification, or as recommended by the licensing authority.

- (c) Section 21 Door Supervision
- Where door supervisors are specified by condition, those individuals must be licensed by the SIA.
- 5. The sub-committee will need to consider the hours of operation proposed in relation to the licensable activities in the light of the promotion of the licensing objectives, the effectiveness of the operating schedule proposed by the applicant, the representations received, the location of the premises in relation to residential and other commercial properties including other licensed premises, the history of the management of the premises and how it is proposed to be run in the future, the evidence produced of any problems in the past, and the likely

impact of any extension of hours and activities. These issues, and any other relevant ones, may be explored at the hearing.

6. Human Rights Act 1998

- The sub-committee must also have regard to the provisions of the Human Rights Act 1998 when determining this application. The 1998 Act made the European Convention of Human Rights directly enforceable in British courts. The relevant provisions are Article 6 (right to a fair trial), Article 8 (right to respect for private and family life), Article 11 (freedom of association) and Article 1 of the First Protocol (right to peaceful enjoyment of one's possessions). These provisions are explained below. Essentially, they require the sub-committee to identify correctly the competing interests, give each appropriate weight in the circumstances of the case, and balance them against each other in order to arrive at a fair and reasonable decision.
- Under Article 6, "everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law". The procedures established by this Council for hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 are compliant with Article 6.
- Under Article 8, "everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life, his home and his correspondence". This right may not be interfered with except in accordance with the law and as may be "necessary in a democratic society in the interests of national security, public safety or the economic well-being of the country, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals, or for the protection of the rights and freedoms of others". In Licensing Act cases this means that the sub-committee must have regard to the effect of its decisions on local residents, and balance their interests against those of the public at large (e.g. the customers of the premises under consideration) and the people operating the business from the premises.
- Under Article 11, "everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and to freedom of association with others" except where it is lawful to restrict that freedom in the interests of national security or public safety, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals or for the protection of the rights and freedoms of others". In Licensing Act cases this means, for example, that the subcommittee is entitled to impose conditions to ensure that patrons of licensed premises do not unreasonably disturb others living or working nearby. Again, the sub-committee should balance the competing interests.
- Article 1 of the First Protocol (that is, the first amendment to the Convention) says that every natural or legal person (meaning a human being or a company) is entitled to peaceful enjoyment of his possessions, except where the law provides for restrictions on that right in the public interest. This means, for example, that it is compliant with the Convention to impose restrictions, such as those provided in the Licensing Act 2003, upon business premises where it is in the public interest to do so. On the other hand the same applies to the owners and occupiers of neighbouring premises.

7. Appeals.

If the sub-committee imposes conditions on the licence with which the applicant disagrees, or modifies the licensable activities permitted or refuses to specify a person a designated premises supervisor, he or she may appeal within 21 days of notification of the decision to the Magistrates' Court. The applicant may also appeal if an application for a premises licence is rejected. Those making relevant representations may appeal if they believe that the licence should not have been granted, or that, when granting the licence, the

licensing authority ought to have imposed different or additional conditions or excluded a licensable activity or refused to specify a persona as designated premises supervisor. The magistrates' court may dismiss the appeal, or substitute its own decision, or send back the case to the licensing authority with directions as to how the case is to be dealt with. The magistrates' court may make any costs order it thinks fit.

8. Review provisions.

If extended hours/licensable activities are granted, the Licensing Act contains review provisions which enable those living or running businesses in the vicinity of the premises, bodies representing them or any of the responsible authorities to apply to this licensing authority for a review of the licence. A hearing follows which enables the sub-committee to use the normal powers at a hearing (set out above) but also to suspend the licence for a period of up to three months or to revoke it.

9 Police Closure

A senior police officer may close any premises for 24 hours (this can be extended) where s/he reasonably believes there is or is likely imminently to be disorder on, or in or in the vicinity of the premises and their closure is necessary in the interests of public safety. Closure can also be effected if public nuisance is being caused by noise coming from the premises and closure of the premises is necessary to prevent that nuisance

The Devon and Cornwall Constabulary are in the process of seeking a Cumulative Impact Zone for the Town centre area of Exmouth.

Within East Devon District Council's licensing policy Cumulative Impact is referred to at paragraph 5.8, it states that 'Where the number, type and density of licensed premises are unusually high, serious problems of nuisance and disorder have sometimes arisen or have begun to arise outside or some distance from the licensed premises. This has been described as the cumulative impact of the increasing capacity of all the premises taken together'.

The Devon and Cornwall Constabulary, as a responsible authority, submit that this is the case in respect of the Exmouth town centre area. Recent evidence submitted to the Town Council demonstrates that there has been an increase in alcohol related crime, disorder and anti social behaviour within the proposed CIZ area. This increase has effected both crime and incident levels (Analytical data has been provided in relation to the 'Bargain Booze' application highlighting this).

In our efforts to maintain control over these increasing alcohol crime and incident levels we are reviewing all licensing applications thoroughly against the licensing objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

The proposed cumulative impact area already has a high number of licensed premises within a small geographic area. There are 24 public houses, 2 night clubs, 12 off-licences and 29 other licensed premises.


Local police officers and the police licensing officers have looked at specifically targeting individual premises. This process has highlighted that in general licensed premises within the town are run well. It is evident that the root cause of issues is the cumulative impact of licensed premises taken as a whole.

The 3 charts below indicate the scale of the problem being faced by the police and other agencies. They provide a brief overview of the numbers of crimes being committed within the proposed area. Each chart highlights in black the % of crimes being committed within the town centre out of all the total crimes being recorded with Exmouth Sector; this sector covering the towns of Exmouth and Budleigh Salterton, as

well as outlying villages as far as Otterton, Colaton Raleigh, Farringdon and Clyst St Mary. The figures are for the past 12 months.





The police in Exmouth have utilised all available police powers in their efforts to control crime, disorder and anti social behaviour. To complement existing powers further

legislation has been introduced. Such as section 30 of the Anti Social Behaviour Act 2003 and Section 27 of the Violent Crime Reduction Act 2006.

It is the view of the police that the application from Bargain Booze to open an off licence should not to be granted.


The rationale for this is:



Research was requested on behalf of Insp. Capey, in order to substantiate the lodging of an objection to an application submitted for a new Premises Licence for 9 Rolle Street, The Strand, Exmouth which was formerly known as the Metro Centre. This application is based on the grounds of prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety and that the location for which the Licence is sought sits directly within the violent crime and disorder "hot spot" area of the town.





Days and Times

Peak Time analysis shows that the weekends and overnight Wednesday are peak times for offences, it was found in this analysis that across Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday offending increased, but most significantly on a Saturday. Sundays are seen as relatively high, however this may be skewed because the day and time is based on the reported time, and may show those crimes which have occurred over the weekend but are not reported until the Sunday.



Summary

From the Analysis it is quite apparent that there has been an increase of 21.2% in Alcohol related Violence incidents and 0.3% increase in crime within the Exmouth Town Centre for the periods 1st January 2009 to 31st December 2009 compared with the same period in 2008. This has been a steady increase over the year despite Section 27 and Section 30 being place.

It is perceived that there is already a saturation of certain types of premises that sell alcohol within the locality of the proposed premises. If the application is to succeed it can only contribute to the already increasing levels of violent crime, disorder and anti social behaviour and can only enhance the problems that Exmouth is already experiencing with underage drinking all within the main Evening and night time economy of Exmouth.


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
















APPENDIX D

Applicants Proposed Operating Schedule

- 1. The applicant will manage these premises in line with all four of the licensing objectives.
- 2. The premises are covered by CCTV. The system records and the data is retained for at least 28 days. The data will be made available to the authorities on request.
- 3. Whenever the DPS is not at the premises, they will ensure that the premises will be managed by a suitably responsible person.
- 4. The licence holder is aware of their responsibilities under the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety Order) Act 2005.
- 5. The Challenge 21 scheme will be adopted at the premises. Any person who appears to be under the age of 21 will be challenged for identification to prove that they are over the age of 18. The only identification that will be accepted are a photgraphic driving licence, passport or a government approved PASS card.

Items for Consideration

Replace conditions 1-5 of Appendix D with

- CCTV must be installed, operated and maintained to the satisfaction of the Licensing Authority.
- CCTV recordings must be maintained for a period of 14 days or for a period of time to be agreed in writing by the Licensing Authority.
- If the CCTV equipment is inoperative the Licensing Authority must be informed within 7 days and immediate steps to be taken to restore the equipment to full working order.
- 4. The Licence Holder must ensure that whenever the Designated Premises Supervisor is not at the premises, a responsible person will be nominated to manage the premises.
- 5. The fire safety measures with which the premises are provided must be maintained in good working order, and their adequacy will be determined on a regular basis, by the carrying out of a fire risk assessment as required by, and in accordance with the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005.
- 6. Any person attempting to purchase alcohol who appears to be under the age of 21 will be challenged for identification to prove that they are over the age of 18. The only acceptable forms of identification a photgraphic driving licence, passport or a government approved PASS card.
