The Sub Committee gave consideration to an application for the grant of a Premises Licence to allow live and recorded music, performance of dance, late night refreshment and the sale of alcohol on the premises at Sidmouth Manor Hotel, Manor Road, Sidmouth, EX10 8RU.

The Sub Committee carefully considered the application for the licensable activities and the proposed hours of operation with a view to deciding whether the application promoted the licensing objectives, as required by the Licensing Act 2003. Government Guidance, the Council's own licensing policy and the Human Rights Act 1998 were also taken into account in making the decision.

The Sub Committee carefully considered the relevant representations that all parties had made, the written representations and other documentation put before the Sub Committee. The Sub Committee considered the particular locality of the premises in and its physical relationship with other residential properties in the vicinity.

The Sub Committee considered it relevant that no representations had been received from the police in relation to the Licensing Act objectives that had been the subject of representations which were, public nuisance and crime and disorder. From this the Sub Committee concluded that the police did not consider that there were currently any significant problems associated with the current operation of the premises, or that there were likely to be if the application was granted.

The applicant, Mr Simon Maguire – Operations Manager case on paper, was that Sidmouth Harbour Hotel was currently licensed under the name of Westcliff Hotel, the licence having been converted and varied in 2005 from the old licensing regime under the local magistrates into the new format of the Licensing Act 2003. The hotel had been subject of recent structural alterations and upgrade and the old licensed area on the ground floor had been altered and extended to such an extent that a new premises licence was required. An application for a new premises licence was originally submitted on 22 December 2016 but failed due to an error by the applicants in advertising the application in a local paper within ten working days as required under the Act.

At the hearing he added that the application for a new licence was being made because of significant changes to the structure of the building. The premises had a good record in terms of issues with the previous licence.

The applicant understood the fears of the local residents and was sensitive to those matters raised in their representations, and would continue to take them seriously. He stated that he wished to work with the Sub Committee to ensure that the premises that would not reflect poorly on the hotel's reputation.

When questioned by the Sub Committee the applicant made a number of concessions concerning conditions for operation around management of noise, curtailing of hours for sale of alcohol and closure of the premises to the general public.

The interested parties case on paper was that in relation to the prevention of crime and disorder, late night drinking so often was the cause of crime and disorder and they did not want Sidmouth to become one of those towns. Regarding the prevention of public nuisance, there would be noise from the extended outside terraces with doors opening from the dining room and drinking areas.

Mr & Mrs Page explained the proximity of their property (Clifton Cottage) to the applicant's premises. The new facility changed the nature and operation of the premises. The property was being heavily promoted as a wedding event venue. His very recent experience was that there was considerable noise from lunchtime onwards coming from the open terrace. This impinged upon the quiet enjoyment of his own property. Mr Page had reason to complain about a recent event to the management but he was unsure whether the noise issue had been dealt with. He stated that he had measured noise volume from his property and stated that sound levels on a Saturday evening were 70 dB, this was from a disco that had ended at midnight.

Mr Page hoped that management would take control of sound levels but he doubted that however large notices displayed within the premises were, he feared that wedding quests would not respect the disruption to the amenity and effect of noise for the local residents. He stated that noise should not be audible beyond the boundary of the premises.

Ms Anthea Millett stated that the purpose of the Licensing Act was to strike a balance between what was reasonable to operate in the location and consideration of the effect that the premises might have on crime and disorder and public nuisance. She could not understand why the applicant was requesting the sale of alcohol and operation of the premises for much longer than that which they stated they were actually going to operate.

The Sub Committee carefully considered the operating schedule put forward by the applicant and the likely impact of the application. In relation to the evidence heard regarding the history of the premises, it was considered that the establishment would be well managed and controlled and there would be appropriate policies in place.

The Sub Committee did not accept that there was evidence of a significant public nuisance, risk to crime and disorder, arising from the operation of the premises. This was because of a lack of evidence of complaints to the statutory authorities. The Sub Committee had however, taken into account the concern the interested party about future operation by ensuring that suitable conditions were imposed and that the operating hours were not unreasonable late.

At the present time there was no real evidence that the operation the applicant proposed to run would cause the unacceptable impact local residents suggest.

All parties were reminded of the closure and review powers which the Government brought into force when the new licences were operational from 24 November 2005. Premises which did not operate in an acceptable way in terms of the licensing objectives may in extreme cases be closed down by police action or have their scope of operation reduced by the licensing authority. RESOLVED 1.

that a grant of a Premises Licence be made as follows:

- a) The extent of the areas within which the various licensable activities will be permitted is as indicated by the legends on the applicants' plan.
- b) Permitted hours for the various licensable activities will as set out in the amended Appendix A.

1 Description of Application

1.1 An application has been received from LT Catering Company Ltd of 11 Evett Close, Exmouth, Devon, EX8 4RY, for the grant of a premises licence at Tea Pots Café, Withycombe Village Road, Exmouth, Devon, EX8 3AN.

- 1.2 The proposed timings and licensable activities applied for are produced in table form at **Appendix A**.
- 1.3 A full copy of the application is reproduced at **Appendix B**.
- 1.4 The proposed premise to be licensed is a small café on the ground floor of a two story building situated in a parade of six linked small shops. There are a total of seven residential flats above the row of shops The premises are set up with table and chairs with a small counter internally and a small railed off outside area set up with two tables and chairs. The premise is situated in Withycombe Village on the outskirts of Exmouth Town. The area is in a mixed commercial and residential area but predominately residential.
- 1.5 A copy of the plan of the premises will be available at the meeting for the information of the committee to show the layout of the site and the proposed areas of licensable activity.

2 Statutory Bodies' Response

- 2.1 Devon & Cornwall Constabulary Representations have been received.
- 2.2 Devon & Somerset Fire & Rescue Service No representations have been received.
- 2.3 Area Child Protection Committee and Local Safeguarding Children Board No representations have been received.
- 2.4 Devon Trading Standards No representations have been received.
- 2.5 East Devon District Council, Environmental Health Service No Representations received.
- 2.6 East Devon District Council, Planning & Countryside Service No representations have been received.
- 2.7 Primary Care Trust No representations have been received.

3 Representations and Responses to Notices of Hearing

- 3.1 Representations have been received from the Devon and Cornwall Constabulary, a councillor for Exmouth Withycombe Raleigh Ward and 34 local residents. It should be noted that 29 of the objectors have the same representation as they had signed a petition circulated in the area. Details of their representations are attached at Appendix C.
- 3.2 Responses have been received from the Devon and Cornwall Police who will attend the hearing represented by Sgt Mike Norsworthy. Cllr Brian Bailey a councillor for Exmouth Raleigh Ward together with two local residents will also be attending the hearing one of whom will be representing 5 other residents who have responded nominating him as the person they wish to speak on their behalf. 6 other residents have responding and wish their representations to go ahead but will not be attending the hearing. No responses have been received from 21 other residents who had made representations. Details of the responses to the statutory Notice of Hearing are attached at **Appendix D**.

4 Proposed Operating Schedule and Mediation

- 4.1 A mediation meeting chaired by the Licensing Authority was held at Tea Pots Café on Tuesday 9 May 2017 but was unsuccessful.
- 4.2 The conditions offered by the applicants on their operating schedule have been reproduced at **Appendix E** and have been numbered for ease of reference.

5 Relevant Licensing Policy Considerations

Licensing Objectives

- 5.1 Section 3.1.1 of the Policy states: 'The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Act to carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives.' These are:-
 - □ The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public safety
 - □ The prevention of public nuisance
 - □ The protection of children from harm
- 5.2 Section 3.1.2 of the policy states: These objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining the application and any conditions attached must be appropriate in achieving the licensing objectives.
- 5.3 Section 3.1.3 of the Policy states: A licence will only be granted where the Licensing Authority is satisfied that these objectives have been met.

Conditions

- 5.4 Section 6 of the policy sets out what the Sub Committee should consider before imposing conditions on a licence.
- 5.5 Section 6.3 of the policy states: Generally it is recognised that the licensing function is not to be seen as a mechanism for the general control of anti-social behaviour by individuals/groups once they are beyond the direct control of the licence holder of any premises concerned. But the Licensing Authority's discretion may be engaged if relevant representations are made and there is an evidential link between the disturbance and the licensed venue.

Licensing Hours

- 5.6 Section 10.1 of the Policy states: The licensing authority will deal with the issue of licensing hours on the individual merits of each application. When the Authority's discretion is engaged consideration will be given to the individual merits of an application but the presumption will be to grant the hours requested unless there are objections to those hours raised by Responsible Authorities or any other person on the basis of the licensing objectives. However, when issuing a licence with hours beyond midnight higher standards of control will generally need to be included in operating schedules to promote the licensing objectives especially for premises which are situated near residential areas.
- 5.7 Section 10.4 of the Policy states: The terminal hours will normally be approved where the applicant can show that the proposal would not adversely affect the licensing objectives unless, after hearing relevant representation the licensing authority believe it necessary, proportionate and reasonable to restrict the hours required.

Nuisance

5.8 Section 16.1 of the Policy states: To promote the licensing objectives, applicants for licences for licensable activities will be required to demonstrate the measures they have in place for the prevention of public nuisance. The impact of the licensable activities on people living in the

vicinity should not be disproportionate or unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter. The prevention of public nuisance can include low-level nuisance affecting a few people living locally as well as a major disturbance affecting the whole community. It may also include the prevention of the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of interested parties.

Capacity

5.9 Section 17.1 of the Policy states: Where it is considered necessary to control the maximum numbers of persons attending premises for the purpose of preventing crime and disorder or for public safety the licensing authority will expect this to be addressed in the operating schedule. The licensing authority, if relevant representations are made and only then if such conditions are deemed necessary, proportionate and reasonable, may impose a condition stipulating a maximum number of persons permitted to attend premises where it considers it necessary to prevent crime and disorder or for public safety purposes.

5.10 The **Guidance** issued under Section 182 Licensing Act 2003 states:

The licensing authority may not impose any conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following receipt of relevant representations and it has been satisfied at a hearing of the necessity to impose conditions. It may then only impose conditions that are appropriate to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives. Such conditions must also be expressed in unequivocal and unambiguous terms to avoid legal dispute.

It is perfectly possible that in certain cases, because the test is one of appropriate, where there are other legislative provisions which are relevant and must be observed by the applicant, no additional conditions at all are needed to promote the licensing objectives.

The Act requires that licensing conditions should be tailored to the size, style, characteristics and activities taking place at the premises concerned.

Licensing authorities should therefore ensure that any conditions they impose are only those which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, which means that they must not go further than what is needed for that purpose.

Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are appropriate and proportionate for the promotion for the licensing objectives. If other existing law already places certain statutory responsibilities on an employer or operator of premises, it cannot be appropriate to impose the same or similar duties.

6. Observations

- 6.1 Following the implementation of the first set of regulations under the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act on 25 April 2012 a new provision relating to the 'test' that Licensing Committees should consider when deciding on licensing applications was introduced. The evidential level for Licensing Committees has been lowered so that the test now is that their decisions need only be 'appropriate' and no longer 'necessary'.
- 6.2 The application being considered is for the grant of a Premises Licence to allow:
 - The Sale of alcohol on and off the premises
- 6.3 Tea Pots Café is situated in a row of shops in Withycombe Village and has been operating as a café for about six months. The owners wish to expand their business and want to be able to offer customers alcohol. They feel that there would be a call for a licence as customers have been asking if they could include alcohol sales in their service. The application is to licence

the inside public area of the café as well as a small outside area that has been railed off and is set up with two tables and chairs. Details of the hours requested can be seen at **Appendix B**.

- 6.4 Following submission of the application representations were received from the police, a ward councillor and 34 local residents. It will be noted that 29 representations have the same content this is because they are part of a petition circulated in the area against the application.
- 6.5 The police concerns are that the applicants intend to change the café into a pub and that the location of the premises in a residential area make it unsuitable for the late hours requested in the non-standard section of the application extending the hours on a Bank Holiday Friday to Monday and Christmas Eve to 1am (although they have no objection to the New Year's Eve extension requested as this is fairly standard across the district). The police oppose the licensing of the outside area for the sale and consumption of alcohol as requested in the application. They raise concerns that there is a large community college and a primary school located nearby and that school children frequent the Central Stores Supermarket on one side of the premises and the fish and chip shop on the other side of the premises. They are concerned that alcohol could be supplied to children from the outside area or they could drink alcohol left on the tables by previous customers. They feel that any licensable activities should be carried out inside the premises and under the control of the applicant. The police are of the opinion that the outside area would cause conflict with residents, passers-by and shoppers and will cause a noise and litter nuisance. They are concerned that older residents living in the warden controlled bungalows opposite the café may be frightened to pass the area with people drinking outside. They are also concerned that a communal alleyway next to the chip shop will be used as a toilet as they feel the internal toilets of the café are inadequate. The police believe that these premise may be turned into a 'pub' style of operation and if so suitable conditions should be placed onto the licence. They have submitted photographs of the area and have included a list of conditions that the committee may wish to consider in their response to notice of hearing Appendix D.
- 6.6 The representations received from local residents mirror that of the police and they believe the premises will be turned into a pub but also raise issues of noise from inside and outside the premises causing a nuisance to residents including children living in the flats above the shops. Their concerns are that vulnerable people both elderly and the young will be mixing with intoxicated customers of the café particularly with customers queueing at the chip shop and Central Stores. As there is no dedicated smoking area customers will use the outside area/street to stand around smoking. There are concerns that as there is no car park in the area customers will have to park in the already congested residential streets causing danger to school children and the elderly crossing to the shops. They also raise concerns that the school has after school clubs with parents and children using the area for dropping off and picking up the children. Comment has also been made that there are already two pubs located nearby and another licensed premises is not needed.
- 6.7 The applicant has responded to the notice of hearing and has included details of location, print out of the current premises licence and photographs of the two pubs located nearby. The photographs show one premises situated opposite the primary school with tables and chairs outside with no railed off area and a 'sweets' counter. The other pub is situated next to the primary school and shows a picture of the outside smoking area. He has also included details of the off licence that the Central Stores shop has next door to his property. He has included a map of the area showing where objectors who signed the petition live and points out that of the 25 households signing the petition only 6 live in Withycombe Village Road. He also points out that there have been no objections made from anyone in Burnside or Denning Court (warden controlled housing). He also mentions that the petition was organised by the manager of Central Stores next door to his premises. The applicant has offered the following compromises on his response to notice of hearing that the committee should be aware of –

- 1. I will install CCTV
- 2. I am happy to limit drinking on our outside seating area between the hours of 9am to 9pm.
- 3. No extended hours on Bank Holidays.
- 4. I will use the challenge 21 policy.

Details can be seen at Appendix D.

- 6.8 The committee will be aware that the number of licensed premises in an area should not restrict the granting of another licence and that each application should be considered on its own merits.
- 6.9 The Sub Committee will now need to consider whether to grant this application as it stands or in the light of the representations to refuse the application or grant it in a different form.
- 6.10 A location plan is attached at **Appendix F**.

Legal Advice

- 1. As relevant representations have been made in respect of the application, this hearing must be held. (Relevant representations are about the likely effect of the grant of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives, by any person, bodies representing them or responsible authorities). The sub-committee must disregard any information or evidence not relevant to the licensing objectives.
- 2. The sub-committee must consider this application in accordance with Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003, which requires that licensing functions must be carried out with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives. The licensing authority must also have regard to its own licensing policy and the Secretary of State's guidance, but may depart from both if it has good reason to do so. Those reasons should be stated.
- **3.** Section 18 of the Act requires the licensing authority to grant a premises licence unless it considers additional steps are needed for the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to any relevant representations.

The steps are:

- (a) to grant the licence subject to:
 - (i) the conditions in the operating schedule modified to such extent as members consider necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and
 - (ii) any condition which must under sections 19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence;
- (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates
- (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor
- (d) to reject the application.

The conditions of the licence are modified if any are altered or omitted or any new condition is added. Different conditions may be applied to different parts of the premises, and to different licensable activities. The sub-committee must give its reasons for its decision to take any of these steps. Similarly, if any part of an application is rejected, the sub-committee must give its reasons.

4. The Act requires mandatory conditions to be imposed where supplying alcohol or exhibiting films are approved as licensed activities. It also requires a mandatory condition to be imposed where door supervisors or other individuals carrying out security activities are conditions on the licence.

(a) Section 19 - Mandatory conditions relating to the supply of alcohol

- (a) There shall be no sale or supply of alcohol when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this premises licence or at a time when the said premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or when his/her licence is suspended.
 - (b) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Source: Section 19 Licensing Act 2003

- (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective.
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective.
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 3. The responsible person shall ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 4. (1) The premises licence holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the

policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either –

- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that-
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-
 - (i) beer or cider: $\frac{1}{2}$ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.
- (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
 - (2) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7(1)
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula —

 $P = D + (D \times V)$

where---

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (3) Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4) (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Source: Section 19A Licensing Act 2003

(b) Section 20 - Mandatory condition relating to exhibition of films – not required Children may only be admitted to films in accordance with the classification recommendations of the British Board of Film Classification, or as recommended by the licensing authority.

(c) Section 21 - Door Supervision- not required

Where door supervisors are specified by condition, those individuals must be licensed by the SIA.

5. The sub-committee will need to consider the hours of operation proposed in relation to the licensable activities in the light of the promotion of the licensing objectives, the effectiveness of the operating schedule proposed by the applicant, the representations received, the location of the premises in relation to residential and other commercial properties including other licensed premises, the history of the management of the premises and how it is proposed to be run in the future, the evidence produced of any problems in the past, and the likely impact of any extension of hours and activities. These issues, and any other relevant ones, may be explored at the hearing.

6. Human Rights Act 1998

- 6.1 The sub-committee must also have regard to the provisions of the Human Rights Act 1998 when determining this application. The 1998 Act made the European Convention of Human Rights directly enforceable in British courts. The relevant provisions are Article 6 (right to a fair trial), Article 8 (right to respect for private and family life), Article 11 (freedom of association) and Article 1 of the First Protocol (right to peaceful enjoyment of one's possessions). These provisions are explained below. Essentially, they require the sub-committee to identify correctly the competing interests, give each appropriate weight in the circumstances of the case, and balance them against each other in order to arrive at a fair and reasonable decision.
- 6.2 Under Article 6, "everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law". The procedures established by this Council for hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 are compliant with Article 6.
- 6.3 Under Article 8, "everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life, his home and his correspondence". This right may not be interfered with except in accordance with the law and as may be "necessary in a democratic society in the interests of national security, public safety or the economic well-being of the country, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals, or for the protection of the rights and freedoms of others". In Licensing Act cases this means that the sub-committee must have regard to the effect of its decisions on local residents, and balance their interests against those of the public at large

(e.g. the customers of the premises under consideration) and the people operating the business from the premises.

- 6.4 Under Article 11, "everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and to freedom of association with others" except where it is lawful to restrict that freedom in the interests of national security or public safety, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals or for the protection of the rights and freedoms of others". In Licensing Act cases this means, for example, that the sub-committee is entitled to impose conditions to ensure that patrons of licensed premises do not unreasonably disturb others living or working nearby. Again, the sub-committee should balance the competing interests.
- 6.5 Article 1 of the First Protocol (that is, the first amendment to the Convention) says that every natural or legal person (meaning a human being or a company) is entitled to peaceful enjoyment of his possessions, except where the law provides for restrictions on that right in the public interest. This means, for example, that it is compliant with the Convention to impose restrictions, such as those provided in the Licensing Act 2003, upon business premises where it is in the public interest to do so. On the other hand the same applies to the owners and occupiers of neighbouring premises.

7. Appeals

If the sub-committee imposes conditions on the licence with which the applicant disagrees, or modifies the licensable activities permitted or refuses to specify a person a designated premises supervisor, he or she may appeal within 21 days of notification of the decision to the Magistrates' Court. The applicant may also appeal if an application for a premises licence is rejected. Those making relevant representations may appeal if they believe that the licence should not have been granted, or that, when granting the licence, the licensing authority ought to have imposed different or additional conditions or excluded a licensable activity or refused to specify a persona as designated premises supervisor. The magistrates' court may dismiss the appeal, or substitute its own decision, or send back the case to the licensing authority with directions as to how the case is to be dealt with. The magistrates' court may make any costs order it thinks fit.

8. **Review Provisions**

If extended hours/licensable activities are granted, the Licensing Act contains review provisions which enable any person, bodies representing them or any of the responsible authorities to apply to this licensing authority for a review of the licence. A hearing follows which enables the sub-committee to use the normal powers at a hearing (set out above) but also to suspend the licence for a period of up to three months or to revoke it.

9. Police Closure

A senior police officer may close any premises for 24 hours (this can be extended) where s/he reasonably believes there is or is likely imminently to be disorder on, or in or in the vicinity of the premises and their closure is necessary in the interests of public safety. Closure can also be affected if public nuisance is being caused by noise coming from the premises and closure of the premises is necessary to prevent that nuisance

10. Surveillance Camera Code of Guidance-June 2013

Where a relevant authority has licensing functions and considers the use of surveillance camera systems as part of the conditions attached to a licence or certificate, it must in particular have regard to guiding principle one in this code. Any proposed imposition of a blanket requirement to attach surveillance camera conditions as part of the conditions attached to a licence or certificate is likely to give rise to concerns about the proportionality of such an approach and will require an appropriately strong justification and must be kept under regular review. Applications in relation to licensed premises must take into account the circumstances surrounding that application and whether a requirement to have a surveillance camera system

is appropriate in that particular case. For example, it is unlikely that a trouble-free community pub would present a pressing need such that a surveillance camera condition would be justified. In such circumstances where a licence or certificate is granted subject to surveillance camera system conditions, the consideration of all other guiding principles in this code is a matter for the licensee as the system operator.

Guiding principle one states:

Use of a surveillance camera system must always be for a specified purpose which is in pursuit of a legitimate aim and necessary to meet an identified pressing need.

Legitimate aim and necessity are considered in relation to the four licensing objectives which are set out elsewhere within this report if the Committee is considering conditioning any premises licence with the installation of a CCTV surveillance system.

Not far away is a very large school. Prior to this application I visited the premises and spoke to the applicant and gave advice on the Police views should an application
	be submitted. On arrival at the address I immediately noticed an outside seating area up to the recognised pavement and parking bays for cars in the road. The road to my knowledge can be very busy at certain times of the day. I consider the sale or consumption of alcohol at this seating area will impact on the licensing objectives as follows
	Customers drinking or drunk in this area could come in conflict with pedestrians especially school children who frequent other shops in the area. Should queuing occur at the fish and chip shop conflict could be a problem. Elderly persons using the area who are frightened to pass the area
	could step out into the road or become involved with accidents involving parked cars There are limited toilet facilities in the premises and outside customers may find it easier to use a communal access way next to the fish and chip shop. Persons using the outside area especially up to 1 am with cause noise issues for residents above and the for persons living in the sheltered housing opposite.

Customers in this area could supply alcohol to children by way of proxy sales or giving them already purchased alcohol
On entering the premises I found it to be long and narrow and not easily supervised. I was advised that last food orders would be at 9 pm. The premises layout I considered only suitable to be café.
Section 5 of the application states this is a Café providing breakfast, lunch and evening dining in an out of town trading area. However I consider this application is an attempt to create a public house for the following reasons The applicant has applied for no standard times to sell alcohol until 01.00 amounting to 18 days in the year. IF this is to be a café I note no application has been made to have Late Night Refreshment therefore on these days only alcohol can be served The submitted plan for the premises shows the licensable area as DRINKING AREA. Further the offered condition for protection of children shows nobody under 18 will be allowed on the premises after 9 pm which therefore excludes families dining on the premises.
Should these premises be allowed to sell alcohol until 1 am then it will fall upon the police to deal with any issues of Crime and Disorder at times when the officers would be fully committed in the Late Night Economy areas of Exmouth and surrounding towns.
The applicant needs to decide if these premises are a café or a pub and if the latter then suitable conditions need to be in place. There is a mediation meeting on 9 th May chaired by your licensing team. Dependant on the result of this meeting I would at a hearing be able to assist you with conditions the police would feel appropriate to safeguard the Licensing Objectives. These conditions would involve CCTV Door Staff, restricted use of the outside area, alcohol supply only with a meal and a requirement to be seated when consuming alcohol together with a reduction in hours.
Currently there appears to be a trend for property landlords to purchase premises with an alcohol licence already in place and turn them into pubs without the proper checks and balances in place and should this premises be granted a licence it is ripe for such a change.

APPENDIX D
Update following Mediation Meeting
On Tuesday 9 th May 2017 I attended a mediation meeting at Tea Pots Café which was attended by the applicant and other interested parties. At this meeting no common ground could be found and therefore I submit this document as an update to assist the committee.
Initially the applicant stated he would possibly withdraw the non standard timings relating to Bank Holiday weekends however this was later withdrawn although on the hearing date this could still be a consideration.
The Police do not object to the applicant wishing to have New Years Eve de regulated. The Police do not object to the standard hours of 08.00 to 23.00 for the sale of alcohol with a 30 minute wind down closing at 23.30. However The Police do object to the non standard timings The Police do object to the use of the outside area for the consumption of
alcohol. As previously said the applicant needs to decide on the use of the
premises and its identity. Any licensable activities should be carried out within the premises and under the control of the applicant.
Using the outside area will cause conflict with residents, passers-by and shoppers at premises either side. There will be noise nuisance and litter plus the use of the communal alley as a toilet as the internal toilets are inadequate Local school children could have alcohol supplied to them or they could drink alcohol left on the tables by previous customers
I am unable to attend this hearing but my supervisor Sgt Norsworthy will attend and expand on these points and questions as necessary
In order to assist you I list suggested conditions to be placed on the licence as is the usual practice should you be mindful to grant this application. As previously stated I have to assume you are dealing with the application as it currently stands.
CCTV will be installed operated and maintained to the satisfaction of the Licensing Authority and Chief Officer of Police. Images will be retained for a minimum of 14 days copies of which will be supplied to the Licensing Authority or Police upon request.
A CCTV monitor will be installed which affords bar or kitchen staff a view of activities taking place within the premises.
The CCTV system must be operational at all times whilst the premises are trading. If the system is faulty or not working then the Police and East Devon Licensing Service must be informed immediately. Details of the malfunction must be recorded in the premises incident book.

No person carrying open vessels containing alcohol will be admitted to the premises at any time.
No customers will be permitted to take open vessels containing alcohol from the premises.
The outside patio area will not be used for the sale or consumption of alcohol
Whenever the premises are open for licensable activities after 23.00 an SIA registered door steward will be employed until the premises closes
All sales of alcohol shall be ancillary to the sale of food purchases

With regard the above application I would like to answer some of the points raised in the objections to this application.

Premises

Our premise is situated in a parade of business premises including a hair dressers, Chinese takeaway, Chemist, Fish and Chip shop and a Spar convenience store. See photographs marked A & B. The business is currently run by my wife, myself and a part time helper. We currently open during the day and some evenings. We would like a licence as we are going to open more in the evenings and would like to offer alcohol.

Licensed premises on the same Road.

The Holly tree:- It is situated next door to the primary school they have outside seating and the patrons also stand at the path railings and smoke (See photograph marked C) Licence enclosed Marked C1. The opening times are 8am until 12.30am and 1.30am on bank holidays.

The Country House:- It is situated across the road from the school it has tables outside which have no railings around. There is also a sweet counter beside the main entrance. (see Photograph Marked D) Licence enclosed marked D1. The opening times are 10am until 12.30am, 12am on Sundays and 1.30am on bank holidays

The Central store convenience shop:- This is situated right next door to our premise. They are closer to the chemist than us and I believe that the licensee does not work on the premises. Licence enclosed marked E1. They can serve alcohol from 5.30am until 11pm.

Please see Map Marked F to showing where the other licensed premises are and their proximity to the school.

Objections-

Police licensing officer

I had a meeting with Mr Barry Slight at the premises. He has raised two points later hours on bank holidays and drinking on the patio area outside. He said that he would object if I included these requests. This is why we didn't send the application to him first as I knew that he wouldn't approve it. in hindsight I should of removed the late hours on bank holidays I was only going on what other licenses submitted regarding these. I do feel however that we would like to have drinking on the patio area. It is currently laid out with tables and chairs. Both of the the other licensed premises on he same road both being in closer proximity to the primary school have outside drinking. I understand the severity of going against the police licensing office and it wasn't an easy decision that I took lightly but I feel strongly about the outside area.

Public

There have been no objections from Burnside or Denning Court which are the areas of community housing. I would of thought the wardens would of objected if they felt strongly about this. They were fully aware of the application as the manger of Central stores was up there trying to rally support for his petition. My wife who knows the manager said that she has made no comment regarding this application. Please see the map Marked G showing where the objectors live who signed the petition of the 25 objecting households only 6 live on withycombe village Road.

The traffic will not increase as patrons who chose to drink alcohol can not drive by law. The spar shop use the alley way (Marked on B) to store bread containers without the permission of the land owners. The alley has a gate approximately six foot high and latch on which is kept shut.

Compromises.

I am happy to make the following changes to our application

1. I will install CCTV

- 2. I am happy to limit drinking on our outside seating area between the hours of 9am to 9pm.
- 3. No extended hours on bank holidays.
- 4. I will use the challenge 21 policy.

I am a licensee and with that I will have responsibilities to insure that I run my premises in an orderly manor and that there is no rowdy behaviour at the premises.

Additional Conditions

ANNEXE 1 - MANDATORY CONDITIONS

1. (a) There shall be no sale or supply of alcohol when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this premises licence or at a time when the said premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or when his/her licence is suspended.

(b) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

2. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises-

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

3. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either-

(a) a holographic mark, or

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

5. The responsible person must ensure that-

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-

(i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

(b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

6. (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

(2) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7(1) -

(a) duty is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) permitted price is the price found by applying the formula -

 $P = D + (D \times V)$

where-

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) relevant person means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence-

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) relevant person means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) value added tax means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

(3) Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

(4) (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day (the first day) would be different from the permitted price on the next day (the second day) as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

ANNEXE 2 - CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

Embedded Conditions Consistent with the Licensing Act 1964

1. The permitted hours to sell alcohol on this licence do not prohibit or restrict on the licensed

premises the sale or supply to, or consumption of alcohol by, any person residing on the premises.

The permitted hours to sell alcohol on this licence do not prohibit or restrict the supply of alcohol for consumption on premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the businesses carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises. 7. 

(b) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

2. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

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(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises-

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

3. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the

supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy. (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of

age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either-

(a) a holographic mark, or

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

5. The responsible person must ensure that-

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-

(i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

(b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

6. (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

(2) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7(1) -

(a) duty is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) permitted price is the price found by applying the formula -

 $P = D + (D \times V)$ where(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) relevant person means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence-

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) relevant person means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) value added tax means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

(3) Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

(4) (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day (the first day) would be different from the permitted price on the next day (the second day) as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.


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






- 1. A crime prevention policy agreed by us must be in place.
