The meeting started at 10.00 am and finished at 11.30 am.

## \*11 Minutes

The notes of the previous meeting of the New Homes Bonus Panel held on 1 February 2013 were confirmed as a true record.

## \*12 Matters Arising

Application from Dalwood and Shute for a project to work on drainage and other flooding isssues (Minute 6 of 1 February2013 refers

The DCC Locality Development Officer reported that DCC was happy with this application subject to the Devon County Council Flood Team being involved in the planning and were happy with any works.

Application from Axminster Ring and Ride (Minute 7 of 1 February 2013 refers)

Members noted that both Colyton and Uplyme Parish Councils had added their money to the Axminster Ring and Ride project.

## \*13 Chairman's remarks

The Chairman welcomed all those present to the meeting. A number of amendments were made to the applications as set out on an annex to the agenda:

- On page 24, Chardstock and All Saints application, of the agenda, change £1,203.60 to read £1,205.60.
- On page 26, Honiton and surrounding parishes application, change total cost of the project from £12,600 to read £12,597.20.

## \*13 **Chairman's remarks** (Cont)

- Page 27, change grant requested from the PTF from £12,600 to £12,597.20.
- Page 27, Town and Parish Councils contributions, delete £12,593 and leave the box blank.
- Page 53, Exmouth Jurassic Coast Team, change of amounts contributed by each Parish after the closing date, Axmouth - £90, Beer - £240, Branscombe -£185, Budliegh - £1,900, Exmouth - £10,800, Seaton - £2,750, Sidmouth -£4,800. The total amount applied for stays the same.
- Page 72, Broadhembury and Payhembury, change £762.57 to read £814.
   Page 87, Woodbury and Lympstone the split of the £2,381 of funding is £2,282 from Woodbury and £100 from Lympstone.
- Page 96, Rewe and Stoke Canon change 'grant requesting from the parishes together find' information to read - £950.40 (£342 Rewe and £520 Stoke Canon).

## \*14 **Documentation**

The Parishes Together Fund guidance notes and application form, circulated with the agenda were noted.

## 15 Application from Budleigh Salterton and Exmouth for Sharing Street Cleaning and Handyman

The Community Engagement and Funding Officer outlined the project which was to purchase equipment and training for the current shared street cleaning and parish handyman service in Exmouth and Budleigh Salterton. The Exmouth Town Ward Members indicated a concern that they had not been sufficiently briefed on the project and felt that there should be follow up on the money spent to make sure that it had been used appropriately. Cllr Bloxham explained that this was part of the funding agreement that parishes sign.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the Budleigh Salterton and Exmouth joint application for sharing Street Cleaning and Handyman be supported.

## 16 Application from All Saints and Chardstock Parish Councils to improve transport links between two parishes in adverse weather conditions

This was a project to improve the transport links between the parishes of All Saints and Chardstock in times of adverse weather by the provision of grit bins and by the introduction of measures to reduce the effects of flooding at Kit Bridge. The Locality Development Officer reported that DCC would not provide maintenance for the 3 grit boxes and the proposed work to Kit Bridge would need to be agreed with the Flood Risk Team.

## RECOMMENDED:

that the All Saints and Chardstock joint project to improve transport links between the two parishes in adverse weather conditions be supported, subject to negotiations between the local Ward Member, both Parish Councils and the Highways Officer and Flood Risk Officer on the best way forward.

## 17 Application from Honiton with surrounding parishes for equipment for various activities

The Community Engagement and Funding Officer and the DCC Locality Development Officer outlined the application to buy full sets of equipment for a range of activities and age groups. Each set would be stored in a metal 'grab box' and would be available free to groups who were working to provide benefits to the people in the contributing parishes.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the application from Honiton with surrounding parishes for equipment for various activities be supported.

## 18 Application for Jurassic Coast Tourism - promoting the Jurassic Coast as an all-seasons tourist destination

The Community Engagement and Funding Officer and the DCC Locality Development Officer outlined the application to promote the Jurassic Coast as an all-seasons tourist destination. The project had a lot of community support and had encouraged the local councils to work together.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the application to promote the Jurassic Coast as an all-seasons tourist destination be supported.

## 19 Application from East Budleigh with Bicton and Otterton extra works and visits by the Parish lengths-man

The DCC Locality Development Officer explained the application from East Budleigh with Bicton and Otterton for extra works and visits by the Parish lengths-man. There was no facility to expand the current DCC Lengths man operation so this work would have to be undertaken by a private contractor.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the Ea

that the East Budleigh with Bicton and Otterton application for extra works and visits by the Parish lengths man be supported, subject to the work being undertaken by a private contractor and the parishes contacting the DCC Highways and Flood Risk Teams to discuss the best way forward.

## 20 Application from Broadhembury and Payhembury to undertake repairs to the surface of Green Lane

The DCC Locality Development Officer explained the application from Broadhembury and Payhembury Parish Councils to undertake repairs to the surface of Green Lane. Members noted that this work would help bring a lane back into use for local residents.

**RECOMMENDED:** 

that the Broadhembury and Payhembury Parish Councils application to undertake repairs to the surface of Green Lane be supported, subject to negotiations with the DCC Flood Risk Team.

## 21 Application from Beer and Axmouth to undertake a trial programme of works for brook clearance & maintenance, using appointed contractors in Beer & Axmouth

The DCC Locality Development Officer explained that the two parish councils wanted to work together to undertake a trial programme of works for brook clearance and maintenance, using contractors in Beer & Axmouth.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the Beer & Axmouth Parish Council application to

undertake a trial programme of works for brook clearance and maintenance be supported, subject to them contacting the

Flood Risk Team at Devon County Council.

## 22 Application from Woodbury and Lympstone to restore two tombs at Guiliford Burial Ground

The Community Engagement and Funding Officer explained that the two parish councils wanted to work closely together to restore 3 tombs at Guliliford Burial Ground which was situated in Woodbury Parish on the edge of the boundary between Woodbury and Lympstone Parish Councils. It was owned by Woodbury Parish Council and was open to the public at all times.

Members were concerned that there did not appear to be any demonstration of the two parishes working together or any substantial community benefit. Funding put aside for this project could be better used for the joint project to lay plastic mesh across the entrance to Cliff Field, Lympstone.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the Woodbury and Lympstone Parish Councils application to restore 3 tombs at Guiliford Burial Ground be not supported.

## 23 Application from Woodbury and Lympstone to lay plastic mesh (grasscrete Type) across the entrance to Cliff field, Lympstone

The Community Engagement and Funding Officer explained that the two parish councils wanted to work together to lay mesh (grasscrete type) across the entrance to Cliff Field, Lympstone. Members wished to see consideration being given by Woodbury Parish Council to provision of more funding for this project

RECOMMENDED:

that Woodbury, Exmouth and Lympstone application to lay mesh across the entrance to Cliff field, Lympstone be approved, with delegated authority being given to the Chairman in consultation with the Community Engagement Officer and DCC Locality Development Officer, should Woodbury Parish Councils wishes to contribute more finding as their main application (12 above) was refused.

## 24 Rewe and Stoke Canon

## a. Installation of a bus shelter at one end of the village at Rewe

The Community Engagement and Funding Officer explained that Rewe Parish Council wished to install a bus shelter at one end of the village at Rewe. Members noted that Rewe had already received Invest in Devon funding for the bus shelter.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the Rewe and Stoke Canon Parish Councils application to

install a bus shelter at one end of the village at Rewe be not

supported.

## b. Renew the ground area of the play park in Stoke Canon

The Community Engagement and Funding Officer explained that Stoke Canon Parish Council wished to renew the ground area of the play park in Stoke Canon. Members discussed whether Rewe and Stoke Canon would wish to put all of their funding towards this project bearing in mind that the bus shelter project had been refused.

**RECOMMENDED:** that the Rewe and Stoke Canon Parish Council application to

renew the ground area of the play park in Stoke Canon be

supported, .

## \*25 Chairman's closing comments

The Chairman reported that he was pleased to see the way in which the parish and town councils were working together and producing useful projects for their communities. He thanked the Community Engagement and Funding Officer and the DCC Locality Development Officer for all the work that they had done with the parishes.

The EDDC part of the NHB funding would be available in 2013/14 It was yet to be confirmed whether the DCC part of the funding would be available in 2013/14, this would be decided after the May elections. There was currently £40,000 unspent from the 20132/13 funding. Members discussed the options from this funding.

The Chairman thanked those present for attending the meeting.

**RESOLVED:** that the £40,000 unspent from 2012/13 be rolled into 2013/14 as

a separate fund to spend on providing extra funding for good

projects for local communities.

## East Devon District Council 6 month update for the Parishes Together Fund 2012/ 2013

It's now 6 months on so we are contacting all the successful projects to see how you are getting on with your project, getting on with spending the money and to ask if you would like any further help from us.

Please could you send us an update, including things like:

- How far along the project is now
- How successful the project has been, what benefit it has been to the community
- The future of the work or project (if relevant)
- If carrying out the project has had all the parishes involved working together
- How much of the Parishes Together Fund money has been spent
- Attach pictures if you have any
- Any barriers to completing your project such as match funding

## Axminster Town Council- Axe Valley Ring and Ride £11,512.10

At the moment I am waiting for confirmation from Axe Valley Ring and Ride that they have secured sufficient match funding to enable the purchase of a bus. I understand that they will not know the outcome of their applications to certain grant-awarding bodies until the end of the year, so at the moment the project is in a state of limbo. (As you know some funding bodies have a rolling programme of funding while others do so only once a year at a fixed time).

There was a meeting for all the ward parishes on Monday this week and one of the matters raised was whether any of this year's money could be added to last year's money to enable the purchase of a "better" bus if there was a choice available. In fact, you will be receiving a "kite-flying" application for consideration in the September round, although if approved we would not want to draw down the funding until a later stage and it may be that more parishes wished to be involved.

Once the bus has been secured there will be benefits to the communities in various ways:

- a) Restoration of funding from D.C.C. to cover revenue costs (withdrawn because there was only one bus)
- b) Wider possibilities of non-routine journeys for a group of people who come into the vulnerable category.
- c) N/A
- d) I am not sure in what way the parishes are meant to be working together that they don't already work together! In our area we have the Axminster Area D.A.P.C. which meets on a quarterly basis and provides a regular forum for inter-parish co-operation and working together, and often there are other more local opportunities such as charitable trusts, social groups etc. I appreciate that this is not the case in all parts of the county. I have a sense, talking to colleagues over the past year that each parish would have preferred an

option to spend its allocation within its own boundaries, probably to enhance the village hall. Village halls are visited by residents from neighbouring parishes on a regular basis (classes, film clubs, shows etc) so that the benefits would be cross-community.

- e) No money has been spent so far.
- f) Will be delighted to supply a picture once purchase has been made
- g) Difficulty with match-funding see comments above and via latest application.

## Broadhembury and Payhembury- Drainage works to Green Lane £814

The project on Poffitt/Haskins Lane is due to be completed by the end of October 2013, Payhembury side is finished, Broadhembury side should be by the end of October.

- 2. It will be of great benefit as this green lane was absolutely un passable (on foot, horseback bicycles or anything).
  - 3. Storm and hurricanes aside this should now last for the next 2 decades.
- 4. Payhembury and Broadhembury to my knowledge have never worked together on anything before and its been an experience!
- 5. The cost of the work has been considerable so I'm afraid the full P.T.F. has been spent and more from Counties Rights of Way.

Thank you for all your help explaining last Autumn about the funds to us and we are most grateful it is continuing.

## Lympstone and Woodbury- Works to Cliff Field playing field entrance £3,310

Our main contractor was tied up with DCC road works during the summer but he has now completed the first phase of his excavation works.

The materials have been purchased and are on site.

A work party comprising scouts, footballers and parents is now being formed to carry out the next phase which is laying plastic grid blocks.

After that the contractor will spread conditioned topsoil over the area and The Parish Council will sow grass seed.

I hope the work will be finished by the end of the month. We hope to arrange a launch event and will invite you, Exmouth TC and Woodbury PC to come along. I will send a report and pictures when it is all finished and tidied.

I expect all of the money to be spent.

## Shute and Dalwood- Lengthsman Trial £896.50

There is nothing to report at preent but now the summer is over this project will be given priority status.

## East Budleigh with Bicton and Otterton- Flooding and drainage scheme £1421.20

We have now completed our community flood plan which has been approved and adopted by all the agencies concerned, we have identified the gullies and drains that should be kept clear, the Parish length man has made his usual visit during the summer months, we have engaged the services of a private length man with all the right qualifications who will clean the drains keep the gullies clear before the rainy season gets underway, he will also be in touch with Otterton Parish Council who have also engaged his services, this will help keep both villages clear clean and flood free.

I will be in touch with you once the first visit has been completed with perhaps a photo of the works.

## Stoke Canon and Rewe- Play area £950.40

Several schemes have been put forward and several quotes have been gained for the work. Council will make a final decision in their November meeting and the work will then go ahead.

## Ottery St Mary Help Scheme £12,714

## Grit bins and works to Kit Bridge- All Saints and Chardstock £1,205.60

The flood alleviation work at Kit Bridge has been completed with the deeper excavation of existing ditches to allow water that has flooded the road to flow back into the river quicker, and prevent the build up of water that was making this stretch impassable at times. In addition, banks have been constructed to divert any flood water back into the river further downstream. Having enjoyed the driest summer for several years, these measures have not yet been tested, but I'm sure they will in the not too distant future.

The additional grit bins along the route from Chardstock to the A358 at All Saints have been ordered, and we hope will be installed before the winter sets in.

## Out of season Jurassic Coast Tourism brochure- Exmouth Town Council £20,585

See attached draft booklet- is ready to print but they will credit the Parishes Together Fund on it.

## Setting up Hawkchurch Community Shop £537

The Community Shop Committee has had their planning application for the new building passed.

## Grab boxes for young people- Honiton Town Council £12,597.20

Basically we have now ordered and paid for the majority of the equipment to make up the following boxes

- Film Making
- Forestry
- Summer/outdoor Games
- Winter/Indoor Games
- Arts and Craft
- Duke of Edinburgh equipment
- Marquees/Gazebos

We have spent £10,017.94 (excluding VAT) and as long as HTC are able to claim back all the VAT then there should be funding available to cover the cost of insurance and website.

The website is currently being developed where interested partied can find out about what is available and how to get hold of the equipment as well as individual parishes putting notices in notice boards and newsletters.

I know one or two of boxes have been successfully borrowed so once word gets out there this should really pick up.

## Beer and Axmouth- trial programme of works for a lengthsman £775

I am going to contact the contractor today to organise the work. Both parishes were waiting until the autumn before any work was carried out. So, nothing has actually happened yet! I will feedback and send photos etc.

## Brampford Speke, Upton Pyne and Cowley- Community Land Trust £702

The two PCs asked for PTF money so that we could support the joint Community Land Trust project (BSUPC CLT) between our two parishes. We had in mind:

- specifically, some of the money being spent on membership promotion and communication with our two communities, and
- generally, it being used by the CLT to help advance its objects.

The CLT has done lots of communication work with our two communities: regular newsletters in our shared monthly parish magazine, open meetings, door-to-door

letter drops to residents most affected by its affordable housing proposals..... but to date, apart from some printing costs (I believe even hall-hire has been free in these very early days), most of this has been paid for by goodwill and legwork rather than by £. Through these efforts the membership of the CLT has steadily risen to now 42 residents, spread across both parishes. If the planning application is successful this will trigger a round of communication, including a further membership drive - incurring actual £ expenditure.

There are also some basic governance work costs to be covered, and finally some chunky conveyancing costs in respect of the affordable housing project (the CLT has other sources of funding that will help towards these costs).

A probable further application of the PTF money will be towards the preparation & maintenance of the considerable area of amenity land that will come with the first affordable housing project. This land will be owned & managed by the CLT but will be open to all local residents.

Finally, the CLT's ambition is to help deliver a second, community-supported, affordable housing project - this time in Brampford Speke. Undoubtedly, as and when the right opportunity is spotted, this will require £ outlay by the CLT.

## **Shared Street Cleaning and Parish Handyman**

Exmouth Town Council, Budleigh Salterton Town Council

## • How far along the project is now

The Exmouth Supplementary Street Cleaner has been working in Budleigh as Parish Handyman one day a week since June 2013. The two Councils have developed a simple reporting system so that the worker knows exactly what it is he is to do, and the completion of tasks is recorded.

The road signage has been purchased and is used.

The worker has gone on the pesticides course at Bicton College, alongside (and arranged through) EDDC Streetscene.

Outstanding tasks: Strimmer course & purchase of strimmer, Chapter 8 course.

## • How successful the project has been, what benefit it has been to the community

The community has benefitted from jobs getting done which have been outstanding for some time, particularly as weeds in many areas have become very troublesome due to county council cutbacks.

As a result of doing the pesticide course, the worker has enrolled on a GCSE mathematics course to improve his numeracy.

## • The future of the work or project (if relevant)

The funding has helped – and when the project is complete will help even more, for this project to become a permanent arrangement between the two Councils. Interest in this sort of work has been expressed by other town and parish councils in the area.

## If carrying out the project has had all the parishes involved working together

Yes, including Councillors assisting in the works.

## How much of the Parishes Together Fund money has been spent

Pesticides Course 15/16/17<sup>th</sup> July: £700 due (awaiting invoice)

Total Spent so far: £1047

We are happy to wait until the project concludes before claiming this back.

## **Parishes Together Funding**

In February this year, Exmouth Town Council and Budleigh Salterton Town Council put in a bid for funding from the Parishes Together Fund to pay for equipment and training for a Town Handyman.

I had been approached by a local group, Budleigh in Bloom, whose members felt the town was in need of a bit of additional cleaning/tidying up and would benefit from a Town Handyman. As well as planting up the numerous flower beds and planters in the town, Budleigh in Bloom members also clear weeds and litter-pick in readiness for Britain in Bloom judging but were beginning to find there were more weeds and litter than the group could cope with.

Budleigh Salterton Town Council had already discussed employing a Handyman but could not afford to employ someone full time. I knew from conversations with their Clerk, Colin Poole, that Exmouth Town Council was already employing a Town Handyman, so I contacted Colin to see if it was possible if Derek Parsons could come and do some work in Budleigh Salterton.

He agreed to this "job-share" and Derek started working in Budleigh Salterton in June; he works here one day a week. His job-sheet is emailed to Exmouth Town Council each Friday which he then picks up at the start of every week. If he has any queries about any of our tasks, he drops into the office and we point him in the right direction! Derek is paid monthly by Exmouth Town Council who in turn invoice us for the hours worked here.

Derek has been on a weed-spraying course funded by PTF and has purchased additional pieces of equipment to help in his work. He has helped with weeding and litter picking along the seafront, Fore Street and High Street, as well as other areas in the town. In addition to this he has put up some new street signs and is currently putting plot numbers on all the sheds at the newly renovated allotment gardens in the town.

During May & June the Ottery Help Scheme was promoted via Parish Magazines and local newspapers. Articles appeared in most of the Parish magazines. From these articles we had a number of people in the community expressing interest in volunteering. Out of the 10 volunteers we took 6 of them through the full recruitment process. It was encouraging to see that the articles had made an impact. We also had a number of new people asking for support, mainly transport. 5 from Ottery, 2 from Feniton, 2 from Newton Poppleford, 1 from Rockbeare, 1 from Aylesbeare and 2 from Newton Poppleford

Time has also been spent on the content and design on the new leaflet and banners. It was important that the message we sent out within the leaflet portrayed the aim of 'Spotlight on Ottery Help Scheme Project'. Raising awareness to people who need help, may want to help, or, want to donate locally, throughout Ottery St Mary and the surrounding Parishes of Newton Poppleford, Aylesbeare, Rockbeare, Talaton, Feniton Buckrell & Gittisham.

A number of Parish Council Meetings were attended: Aylesbeare, Talaton, Buckrell and more recently Newton Poppleford informing of the project and making contacts looking at ways to work with individual parishes and their groups and activities to help promote awareness.

We have given talks to groups in Ottery St Mary, Feniton & West Hill, all of which attracted donations. Today (Monday 5<sup>th</sup>) we have been talking to the Ottery St Mary Carers Support Group.

Parish events attended include Aylesbeare & Talaton Fete's and Alfington Garden Event... The Festival Jazz event held in aid of the

Ottery Help Scheme was also a good event to promote at, resulting in a further donation.

Early July the long awaited, Leaflets & Banners arrived. With 'tool kit' in hand first stop was Sainsbury's supermarket. 4 hours handing out leaflets prompted within days, 4 new volunteer enquires and 1 donation. Leaflets have been inserted recently in a number of Parish magazines, West Hill, Newton Poppleford, and Tipton St John again producing positive results. We have in the last couple of weeks received 5 one off donations and another 6 people enquiring about volunteering. As you can imagine this has impacted on our time, but also very positive.

We have organised for more leaflets go out into areas we have not yet covered in the coming months, but need to now focus on supporting volunteers through the recruitment process and dealing with new enquires for support and help.

We are also in the process of installing a new database system which will enable us to manage information in a more effective way and produce figures and statistics with the touch of a button!

**Finances** – **to date**. A total of £3481 of the grant has been spent to date mainly on salaries, equipment and publicity material. A further amount of approx £500 has been spent on volunteer recruitment, expenses, and related office costs. A detailed breakdown with receipts will be available shortly.

There has been a very positive start to 'Spotlight on Ottery Project' with momentum really now starting to build. We have a number of promotional events booked in for the coming months and will be producing more publicity material to continue to reach out to people in the community.

Thanks once again for your support and giving the Ottery Help Scheme the funds to make this happen.



## Wet & Wild Days Out





If you've not tried surfing in East Devon yet, you are missing out! Slow moving waves good for long boards and decent barrel reforms for bodyboarders. Exmouth and Sidmouth get waves in huge swells and Exmouth's rocky outcrop, 'the Reef', holds faces up to 6ft with northeast through to northwest wind. Try Orcombe Point which

Provision of Gazebos for community events

## Q6 Why do you want to carry out this project, why is it wanted and what difference will it make?

Local Councils put on events and often need to provide gazebos for small voluntary and charitable organisations which may not have their own available to use. At the moment these are hired for each occasion at a cost of £80 each, whereas they cost £125 to buy. Exmouth would like to buy 20 gazebos in order to vastly reduce the cost to the taxpayer of providing these. The difference it will make is to hugely reduce the cost of including these small groups in community events and celebrations.

## Q7 How do you know this is needed? Who and how have you consulted?

This is a straightforward mathematical calculation. We have discussed alternatives with voluntary groups. Several issues came out in the consultation. The cost to voluntary groups of commercial-quality gazebos is difficult - the amount they raise is often relatively modest and is needed for the core work of the group. However, domestic-quality gazebos are discouraged as there are health and safety concerns about stability in inclement weather e.g. at the Christmas Cracker, gazebos need to be properly anchored, pegs cannot be used on paving and anchors do not hold sectional legged gazebos safely. It has therefore proved necessary for commercial-grade 'pop-up' gazebos to be provided.

## Q8 When do you intend to start work on this project and how long is work likely to take?

The project is straightforward and gazebos would be bought immediately. They would be stored in our existing storage container in Exmouth.
